- Prioritize Planning on Hazards
- Determine & Implement Prevention Actions
- Determine & Implement Mitigation Actions
- Write and Distribute Plans



Terms

- **WILDLAND FIRE:** The unplanned , uncontrolled fire burning in vegetative fuels. Include crops, leaves, fields , trees



- **INTERFACE FIRE:** That which involves a wild land and residential/ commercial area.

Wildfires & The Cape Road

- Decision: Self Evacuate or Shelter or in place?
- Additional factors which might be present:
 - Road blockage because of accident
 - Wind storm, trees/poles down
 - Prolonged power outage
- Most resolve to: *Single Cape Road exit is blocked*



RFRD Resources

- 3-5 members/shift + call crews
- 2 ambulances, 2 tankers, 2 engines, 1 ladder (future), 2 service trucks
- If there is an area-wide disaster, we will be busy elsewhere in town
- Mutual Aid from other FDs
 - Might also be busy with own emergencies
 - Except for Windham, more limited resources & staff than RFRD



RFRD vs Citizens

- **Citizens**
 - Scores of households
 - Many vehicles, which will cause congestion - worse if Frye Island is inhabited
 - Multiple ‘leaders’ unless some ad-hoc organization is formed
 - Mostly untrained, unequipped
 - Must self-prioritize, self-resource



Recent Wildfires

Recent Raymond Wildfires

- May 2024: fire on Little Sebago Lake
 - 3 homes & 1 boathouse destroyed
 - 3 cars & 1 boat destroyed
 - 2 acres of woods burned
 - 11 Fire Departments responded
 - 2 firefighters were taken to hospital with minor injuries
 - The fire re-ignited the next day
- Contributing causes
 - Pine needles and twigs = rapid fire spread
 - Propane tank caught fire

Recent Raymond Wildfires

- 2023:
 - 7 acres off of Spiller Hill Rd
 - Betty's Neck
- 2021:
 - Notched Pond, 4 buildings
 - 30 acres in Naples
- 2018:
 - North Raymond Rd.
 - 300 acres in Kennebunk
- 2017:
 - Betty's Neck
 - Thomas Pond fire, multiple buildings
- 2014: Panther Pond Pines Rd.

Prevention

What You Can Do

- 3 levels of clearing: 0 – 5 ft, 5 - 30, 30 - 100 around your home of dead branches, duff, etc.
 - In Butte County CA, 89% of the homes that had defensible space survived the Park wildfires
- Remove 'ladder' fuels
- Remove pine trees that are close to homes, but observe Shoreland rules (work with COE)
- Put 1/8" or less metal mesh over attic and under eave vents to prevent embers from entering




What You Can Do

- Have a water source such as rain barrels, garden hoses, buckets
- If possible, have an emergency power generator
- Store some canned food & water, a basic first aid kit, and a “Go Bag”
- Have a phone list of neighbors, family
 - Consider traveling with others to reduce traffic load
- Have some trained traffic wardens with vests, flashlights, and a plan to direct traffic



What You Can Do

- Make your drive way allow for both egress & ingress. Have pull offs if needed to pass fire apparatus.
- Get an online permit for burning over 3' x 3' brush, campfires:
<https://apps1.web.maine.gov/burnpermit/public/index.html>
- Even small campfires may be banned during high fire danger – check at RFRD station 655-1187
- Emergency calling: For ANY Emergency (fire, fuel leak, EMS, boat problem, etc.) ALWAYS dial 9-1-1
 - NEVER call any other number for an emergency, because ONLY 9-1-1 is staffed and answered 24 x 7 x 365!
 - Using other numbers will result in delays or no-response!!



Stay Informed

- Fire Class Day Ratings
 - 12 Zones; Raymond area is Zone 9
 - Our weather station is in Lyman
 - Operational late March to late November
 - www.mainefireweather.org/index.php
- Weather
 - Get a NOAA weather radio with alert tones and battery backup (Midland and others, \$50 to \$70)


